

CHRONIC HEALTH EFFECTS

■ Limited evidence suggests that repeated or long-term occupational exposure may produce cumulative health effects involving organs or biochemical systems.

Long term exposure to high dust concentrations may cause changes in lung function i.e. pneumoconiosis; caused by particles less than 0.5 micron penetrating and remaining in the lung.

Endomyocardial fibrosis is reported to be prevalent amongst Nigerians eating large quantities of serotonin-rich matoke bananas. In patients with carcinoid tumours, which produce excessive amounts of serotonin, there is an increase in the incidence of cardiac lesions. Teratogenic effects have been observed in animals receiving large quantities of serotonin

Animal-derived venoms frequently contain serotonin which is thought to act as an inflammatory agent, causing pain and a decrease in blood pressure. Plant products commonly used in "natural" cosmetics and skin-care products may also contain serotonin and other biogenic amines (histamine, acetylcholine). Skin-irritating plants cause inflammation reactions without the involvement of immune responses. The amines cause erythema and itching. Severe symptoms, even fatal reactions, may occur if large areas of skin are involved.

HANDS/FEET

- Suitability and durability of glove type is dependent on usage. Important factors in the selection of gloves include: such as:
- frequency and duration of contact,
- · chemical resistance of glove material,
- · glove thickness and
- · dexterity

Select gloves tested to a relevant standard (e.g. Europe EN 374, US F739, AS/NZS 2161.1 or national equivalent).

- · When prolonged or frequently repeated contact may occur, a glove with a protection class of 5 or higher (breakthrough time greater than 240 minutes according to EN 374, AS/NZS 2161.10.1 or national equivalent) is recommended.
- When only brief contact is expected, a glove with a protection class of 3 or higher (breakthrough time greater than 60 minutes according to EN 374, AS/NZS 2161.10.1 or national equivalent) is recommended.
- · Contaminated gloves should be replaced.

Gloves must only be worn on clean hands. After using gloves, hands should be washed and dried thoroughly. Application of a non-perfumed moisturiser is recommended.

Experience indicates that the following polymers are suitable as glove materials for protection against undissolved, dry solids, where abrasive particles are not present.

- polychloroprene
- · nitrile rubber
- · butyl rubber
- · fluorocaoutchouc
- · polyvinyl chloride

Gloves should be examined for wear and/ or degradation constantly.

ENGINEERING CONTROLS
